#### Port information

Currency

The official currency is **Euro**. Major credit and debit cards are accepted by the majority of shops and restaurants. US Dollars are also usually accepted.

#### Language

The official language is French. English is widely spoken and understood.

#### **Getting around**

Distance to town From the Passenger Terminal it is around a 5 minute taxi Main drive to the town centre. Highlights centre Getting About Taxis will be available from outside the terminal or a walk into the town will take you around 15-25 minutes. There's a helpful "blue line" painted on the roadway that stretches out of the terminal. Alternatively follow street signs pointing to "Centre de Ville". Always confirm the price and the currency you would like to pay in before setting off with a local taxi. Large passenger buses, holding about 40 people, provide Public Transport public transportation services within Fort-de-France. These public buses are the cheapest form of transport on the island. Always double check routes and departure times. Fort-de-France, Martinique's capital, has undergone immense Main change in the past decade. Beginning the 21st century as an Highlights economically backward, dilapidated kind of place, the city has very successfully reinvented itself as a cruise-ship destination, with the construction of two impressive new terminals. More than that, Fort-de-France has rejuvenated its central park, given a coat of paint to many of its buildings and enhanced itself with several pieces of modern architecture. All this has served to breathe fresh life into the largest city in the French West Indies, and cruisers and travelers alike now flock to the place.

A visit to the ruins of the city of St. Pierre is less than an hours drive from Fort-de-France and is well worth a visit. A modern day version of the ruins of Pompeii, it is here that Mont Pelée erupted in 1906, killing 30,000 people in less than 10 seconds. Head to Place Monseigneur Romero (at Schoelcher). There you'll find the Cathedral St.-Louis and a (small) outlet of France's Galeries Lafayette shops, ranging from local stores to French boutiques. The Bibliotheque Schoelcher is a Romanesque-Byzantine-style library and an architectural wonder It was built for the Paris Exposition of 1889 and was shipped piece by piece and then reassembled in Fort-De-France. Fort St-Louis, The hulking fortress that gave the city its name lurks on the far side of La Savane and dates from 1640, although most of what stands today is the result of subsequent additions. After years of being closed to the public, Fort St-Louis is finally open to tours, and it's easily the top sight in town. Buy tickets and join tours at the Tourist Information Kiosk on La Savane. Jardin de Balata, Just 10km outside of Fort-de-France, this mature botanical garden in a rainforest

France, this mature botanical garden in a rainforest setting is one of Martinique's best attractions and it will please anyone with even a passing interest in botany. The hour-long walk around the garden is clearly marked, and a series of tree walks will keep kids interested. An audioguide in English is available.
