



Passports will not be needed whilst you're ashore. Just remember your ship card.




The Local Currency is the Trinidad & Tobago Dollar although US Dollars are also widely accepted.

GETTING ABOUT

When we arrive into Scarborough we'll be docked in the Deep port cruise terminal, close by to the local town. Heading out on foot is very accessible and is around a five to ten minute leisurely walk. You'll also be close by to restaurant facilities, as well as palm fringed beaches of several different resorts.

Alternatively, there are local taxis that can be found in the port area along the pier who can help you to explore the local area of further afield. It's recommended to use official taxis within the port - look out for registrations with the letter 'H' for hire, they may be a little more in price but they are recommended for tourists who are looking to explore.

SHOWSTOPPER SIGHT

Argyle Falls

Tobago's rainforest-clad interiors provides breathtaking scenery. Argyle waterfalls are a series of three tiered cascades reaching up to 175 feet high and crashing into crystal-clear pools.

CULTURE VULTURES

Fort King George

Fort King George was Built by the British in the 1770s, its old buildings and cannons sit in manicured lawns high above Scarborough, giving you breathtaking views over the coastline and capital

SUN-SEEKERS

Pigeon Point

Pigeon Point. With its white sands, nodding palms and turquoise waters, it's arguably the most beautiful beach on the island. Plus, it boasts a restaurant, a cocktail bar and all sorts of watersports.
