DISTANCE TO TOWNAROUND A 20 MINUTE DRIVE

AT A GLANCE

We're docked at the Singapore Cruise Centre. You'll need to proceed through immigration and head down the escalator into the VivoCity mall to go ashore. Follow the signs. Using the MRT is the easiest and cheapest way to get into the city. Taxis are available from outside VivoCity mall and you can expect to pay approximately 15 Singapore Dollars to get to Marina Bay Sands. There is a Hop-On Hop-Off bus available. You can buy a ticket for the bus at the tourist information desk inside the terminal. There is a cable car that runs from the VivoCity mall to Mount Faber and to Sentosa Island. There is a car ordering service called Grab that has an app you can download.

OUT AND ABOUT

Gardens by the Bay: Home to the infamous flower structures, the site is free to visit and they host the light show every night at 19.45 and 20.45. You can purchase individual tickets to visit the Cloud Forest, the Flower Dome, the Supertree Observatory and to walk the Skyway.

Sentosa Island: Here you will find Universal Studios theme park, approximately \$61, S.E.A Aquarium, approximately \$32, and lot's of other attractions.

Clarke Quay: You can pick up a river cruise here, and bars and restaurants line the waterfront promenade for nightlife options.

Raffles Hotel: Around a 15 minute drive from the port, you'll find the hotel where the Singapore Sling was created. Sample one at the Long Bar for approximately \$37.



BEST BEACHES

Beaches can be found at Sentosa Island. Siloso beach is the closest to beach station with plenty to offer such as water sports, a beachfront promenade with bars, restaurants and shops. Tanjong beach is more tranquil, with a beach club and beach volleyball.

SHOPPING

We're docked next to Singapore's largest mall VivoCity, home to well known brands and restaurants. For local shopping, you can head to China Town, where you'll find food street, souvenir shops, and indie boutiques offering clothes, crafts and antiques.

DO IT LIKE THE LOCALS

If you want to eat like the locals, La Pau Sat street food market is a must. Found downtown, dozens of satay stands line the streets and you'll find more choices inside the food hall. Look for the longest line to find the best eats. Also visit local hawker centres like Maxwell Food Centre or Tiong Bahru Market for authentic , affordable cuisines. Explore different neighbourhoods like Katong, Little India, and Joo Chiat to get a sense of Singapore's diverse cultures and history. Each area has its own unique charm.

JUST SO YOU KNOW

Passports are required for going ashore. Singapore prides itself on cleanliness, littering is heavily fined and chewing gum is restricted. Only use designated smoking areas. E-cigarettes are illegal. Mosquito repellent is advised.
